Indian Ocean was battered by world's longest cyclone in 2023

The World Meteorological Organization informed that the Indian Ocean in 2023 was battered by Cyclone Freddy, which wrecked devastation and created havoc in southeastern Africa, has now been classified as the longest lasting tropical cyclone by the United Nations on record which lasted for 36 days. The United Nations climate and weather agency stated that the cyclone had indeed broken the previous record.
